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Two Killed; several injured in weekend accidents

A rural Moundville woman died after a vehicle she was riding in swerved to miss a deer late Saturday on Route N, east of Bronaugh, the Missouri State Highway Patrol said.

Kathy M. Thompson, 51, a passenger in a vehicle driven by her husband, Jawan L. Thompson, 53, both of Moundville route 1, was pronounced dead at 1:53 a.m. Sunday at Nevada Regional Medical Center.

Jawan Thompson swerved to miss a deer and his westbound vehicle ran off the road, went down an embankment and submerged in water in the accident at 11:40 p.m. Saturday on Route N, two miles east of Bronaugh. Tyler Moreland, a highway patrol trooper, said the Thompson car became submerged in a creek bed with about three feet of water.

Moreland said Thompson, who wasn't injured, walked to someone's house to report the accident. A man at the house then accompanied him to the accident scene.

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
